



Humanitarian Response Fund for Somalia

2007 Annual Report

Overview

The emergency pooled fund for Somalia, the Humanitarian Response Fund (HRF), was created in 2004 to provide rapid allocation to support humanitarian activities at the sudden onset of emergency. The Fund is managed by the Advisory Board, consisting six operational UN agencies and three NGO representatives*, and the OCHA HRF secretariat. The final authority for the use of the Fund rests with the Humanitarian Coordinator.

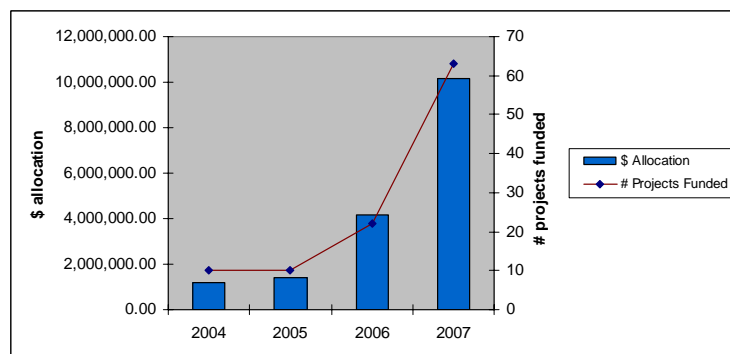
With the generous support from donors, the Fund has grown over the years and in 2007 received more than \$ 17 million in contributions. The donors included Norway, the UK, Sweden, the Netherlands and the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF). Together with the carry forward from 2006, a total of \$19.45 million was at the disposal for the humanitarian partners in 2007 (Table 1). The pledges made at the end of the year enabled the Fund to ensure sufficient balance at the beginning of 2008 in order to provide support to the continuation of key humanitarian interventions at the time when resources are often scarce.

In 2007, approximately 170 project proposals were submitted and the HRF allocated a total of \$10.16 million to 63 projects. The significant growth of the Fund resource and the continuing humanitarian needs during 2007 resulted in a threefold increase in allocation from 2006 (Chart 1).

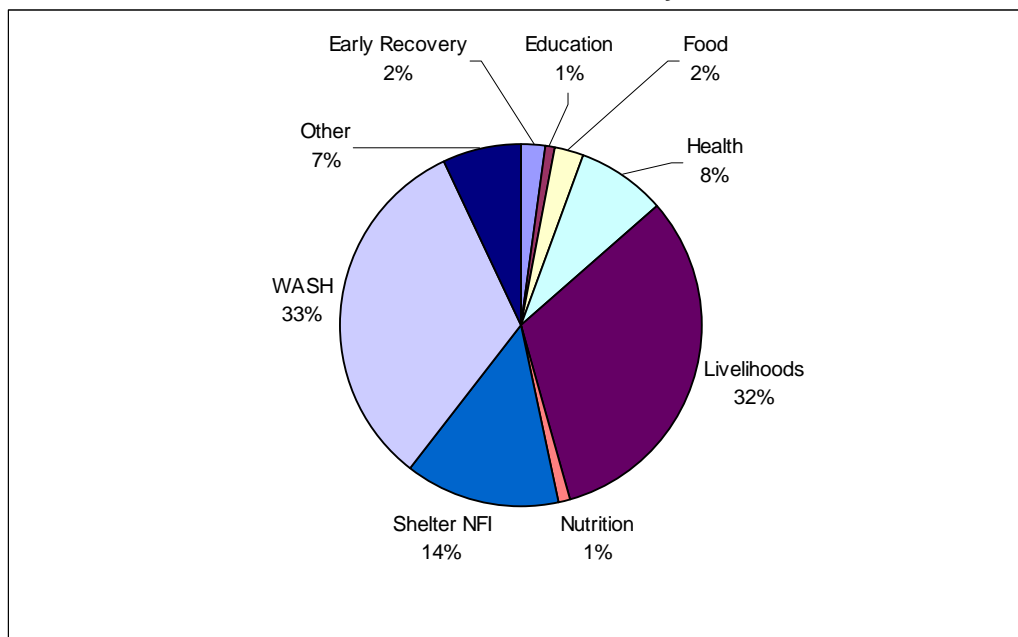
Chart 1: HRF Allocation 2004-2007

In accordance with its mandate, the HRF has primarily focused on funding life saving emergency responses (WASH, livelihoods, health and shelter/NFI) while also providing funds to address gaps in funding, and sectoral and geographical coverage (Chart 2). Geographically, the majority of allocations were made to South Central Somalia, commensurate to the prevailing humanitarian needs. During early 2007, the funding focused on the 2006/7 Deyr flood response and 2006 drought recovery. As the year progressed the focus has shifted to IDP and nutrition crises while at the same time supporting gap areas in early recovery, emergency preparedness and flood mitigations.

In the context of Somalia, local NGOs are often the only ones who can overcome access constraints to reach the most vulnerable. In 2007, the HRF therefore intensified its efforts to make the Fund accessible to competent and credible local partners, either directly or through partnership with international organisations. Two CERF grants totalling USD 3 million to the HRF significantly widened the accessibility for qualified local partners through fund administration by UNDP Somalia. Under the CERF/HRF window, over USD 2.8 million were allocated to 26 projects, 70% of which were proposed by local NGOs directly or in partnership with international organisations.

Overall, half of the projects funded by the HRF in 2007 were submitted by local NGOs directly or in partnership with international organisations – a significant increase from six out of 22 projects in 2006 (Table 2).

The response time of the fund, i.e. the time between the reception of the first project proposal and the disbursement of the first instalment, was in most cases approximately 1.5 months. For extremely urgent cases, approvals were made in a few days after the proposal submission. About 70% of the projects had the implementation duration of three months. 20% of the projects experienced delays in implementation and were granted no cost extension.

During 2007, Somalia suffered once again from multiple severe shocks. These shocks included one of the worst floods in decade, which occurred at the end of 2006/beginning of 2007; the waves of new and ongoing displacement in and around Mogadishu; and the alarming deterioration of nutritional status in South Central as a result of post *Deyr* cropping failure which compounded the effects of earlier multiple shocks in the region. In many of these parts in South Central, communities also needed support for recovery from the 2006 drought and the subsequent 2006/7 floods. In all these instances, the HRF was instrumental in enabling both local and international partners initiate rapid life saving interventions through quick and flexible funding.

Furthermore, the HRF has increasingly sought complementarity with the allocations from the global pooled fund, the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF). OCHA led the consultation amongst the Cluster Leads and the Heads of Agencies to ensure that the CERF allocation requests were made based on integrated response plans and that the HRF would provide complementary allocations, mainly through NGOs, to ensure comprehensive coverage of the CERF supported projects and/or to fill funding gaps.

IDP and Nutrition Emergency Response in South Central Somalia

In early 2007, the conflict and fighting between the Transitional Federal Government (TFG)/Ethiopian forces and anti-TFG elements intensified in Mogadishu, culminating to what is described as one of the worst fighting in 17 years. The ensuing insecurity and continued fighting have led to displacement of almost 800,000 in and around the capital since February. The majority of these IDPs stay in the Shabelles whilst others have moved furtherer to the regions including Galgaddud, Mudug and Hiran. The HRF has been instrumental in supporting local and international partners to initiate rapid life saving activities in this context.

To assist the IDPs displaced within Mogadishu, who are often the most vulnerable and hard-to-reach, **NRC** undertook a six-month emergency sanitation and hygiene promotion in 14 IDP settlements, most of which had had no sanitation facility. **SAACID** is undertaking emergency rehabilitation of 260 settlements in 16 districts in Mogadishu and also operating ten wet food feeding centres in 10 districts, serving 50,000 meals a day over four months.

In the Shabelles, the so-called Afgooye corridor, a 50km stretch of the road between Mogadishu and Afgooye, is where the highest concentration of the newly displaced IDPs is located. The IDPs staying in the settlements along the corridor tend to be extremely vulnerable as they cannot afford to flee furtherer and most of the sites are spontaneous, lacking basic facilities. **Oxfam GB/Hirja** supported emergency WASH for 70,000 IDPs in four settlements while **FERO** built 100 emergency latrines in five IDP settlements. To support IDPs access to clean safe water, **Oxfam GB/CED** partnership carried out emergency water trucking for three months. **CED** subsequently received an additional allocation to continue the water trucking for eight weeks to meet the needs of 60,000 IDPs. With the continuing influx of IDPs, water trucking has been further extended with an allocation to the consortium of **Oxfam Novib**, **CED** and **SAACID**, who are also building additional latrines to meet the needs of growing IDP population.

ADRA's emergency response targeted the conflict-affected IDPs in Belet-Weyne and Buloburte districts of Hiran through NFI distribution, rehabilitation of 10 wells, construction of 17 latrines and 15 garbage pits, hygiene training and peace building activities. **WASDA** provided WASH assistance to the conflict-affected IDPs in Doble, Afmadow in Lower Juba, who were either waiting to return to Mogadishu or staying in Doble due to the border closure. **IMC** supported IDPs from Mogadishu to Baidoa, Bay, by increasing their access to basic health care services and strengthening local health capacity, with a component for GVB reduction in IDP settlements. **Oxfam Novib/WOCCA** distributed cash relief to 980 vulnerable IDP households and built 175 latrines in three districts in Middle Shabelle. **Oxfam Novib/SRDO** implemented cash relief for Mogadishu IDPs in Merka, through which wells have been rehabilitated and newly built. **CISP** addressed access to basic health services and strengthening of referral services in three districts in Galugaduud and Mudug which have received a large number of newly displaced IDPs and experienced AWD outbreak. **CPD** is

rehabilitating a borehole in Adado, Galugaduud, where the water needs have intensified with the influx of IDPs. **Water for Life** is providing emergency education to IDP children in Merka, Lower Shabelle.

In addition to the IDP crisis, South Central is faced with worsening nutrition crisis as a result of the failure of the post *Gu* 2007 seasonal crop in the region, coupled with the effects of a series of disasters, continuing displacement and economic factors. **AMA** provided emergency supplementary feeding intending to cover 60% of malnourished children under 5 years of age in four districts in Gedo.

Flood/Drought Recovery & Rehabilitation and Deyr 2007 Flood Mitigation/Preparedness

Throughout 2007, the HRF has continued support for flood recovery and mitigation assistance. In Middle Shabelle, **UNDP** completed river embankment rehabilitation and strengthening as well as enhancement of community-based flood early warning systems to benefit up to 25,000 riverine households. **WOCCA** also supported the repair of riverbank breaches in 5 villages. **COSV/JCC** supported the rehabilitation of river embankment and breakages along the Juba river in Middle Shabelle and Hiran.

In Lower Shabelle, **SDRO** rehabilitated a small canal and **SORDA** repaired riverbanks to protect farmlands for vulnerable small scale farmers in Sablaale. **COMORAD** is rehabilitating a large canal in Kurtunwarey. **CED** supported flood-affected fisher/farmer communities in Middle Shabelle, Lower Shabelle and Hiran in conjunction with a similar intervention by FAO.

To assist the pastoral and agro-pastoral communities in Lower Juba who remained vulnerable after a series of natural disasters, **Horn Relief** provided cash-based emergency response to improve food security and livelihoods of 4,528 drought/flood affected households in Afmadow and Badhaade and **DIAL** supported improving access to water for remote vulnerable community in Badhaadhe. **JCC** is carrying out embankment in Buále and Saakow.

AFREC completed river embankment repairs at 14 breakage points in Jilib, Middle Juba, by engaging 10,000 vulnerable households, including recent IDPs, for cash-for-work.

SAMRADO is undertaking river embankment, construction of culverts and rehabilitation of irrigation canals through cash-for-work for 3 months, to support livelihood recovery of flood- and conflict-affected poor farmers in Belet-weyne, Hiran.

NCA/SADO rehabilitated irrigation canals (52km) through cash-for-work in Bardera district in Gedo, one of the worst affected areas by the *Deyr* 2006 floods. **SADO** has received additional funding to undertake rehabilitation of water catchments through cash-for-work in 11 agro-pastoral villages in Bardera, aiming to improve the next *Dyer* seasonal crop to assist the communities recover from the *Gu* crop failure. Furthermore, **ASEP** is working on flood mitigation activities in Dolow and Luuq through cash-for-work by flood affected communities.

Bay Women targeted the 1,000 vulnerable pastoralist households who have returned from conflict-affected displacement but lost their livestock to the floods in Baidoa, Bay.

Deyr 2006/7 Flood Response & Early Recovery

During the *Deyr* 2006 floods, **Horn Relief**, **AFREC**, **UNICEF**, **Juba Shine**, **NCA** and **HIWA** distributed NFIs to flood- and conflict-affected people in Middle/Lower Juba, Mogadishu, Gedo and Hiran. The floods also triggered an outbreak of AWD and other water borne diseases. In response, several agencies received HRF funding to improve access to clean safe water: **ADRA** for Hiran; **Bay Women** for Bay; **Farjano** for Middle Shabelle; **AFREC** for Middle Juba; and **Oxfam GB** for Lower Juba. **COSV/JCC**, targeted to benefit 12,000 flood-affected people in Middle Juba for its emergency sanitation and drainage works through cash-for-work.

Intersos' emergency health services benefited around 52,000 people in riverine communities in Middle Shabelle, while **COSV** provided mobile clinics and support to local health services in five districts in Lower Shabelle. **IMC** also operated mobile clinics and distributed nutrition supplies in Hiran.

Mercy USA conducted supplementary feeding for 1,440 beneficiaries who were malnourished children and pregnant/lactating mothers in Middle Juba, while **Humedica** provided therapeutic feeding for malnourished children below the age of five in Gedo. **UNFPA**, together with Muslim Aid UK and Somali Red Crescent Society, provided increased access to quality maternal healthcare services for women affected by the floods and also female IDPs residing in Mogadishu.

To support early recovery of livelihoods of the flood-affected population, **VETAID** distributed over 6,000 goats/sheep to 618 agro-pastoral families in Gedo. **MURDO** and **HARDO** provided seeds and tools in Middle Shabelle and Hiran, respectively. **Muslim Aid** built 10 culverts and rehabilitated five primary canals in Belet-Weyne, Hiran, as a quick recovery scheme.

Funding the Gaps

Emergency Preparedness & Capacity Building of Local NGOs

NRC is assisting the improvement of living conditions against fire hazard by distributing fire retardant temporary shelters and promoting emergency preparedness to 4,000 IDP and returnee households in 19 settlements in Bossaso, Puntland. **Oxfam Novib** is supporting capacity building of local NGOs whose roles are increasingly critical to reach to the target beneficiaries in the Somalia context.

Water Trucking in Diff, Afmadow

A remote town of Diff, Afmadow, in Lower Juba, experienced extreme water shortage since the main borehole's collapse and failure of Deyr seasonal rains. All but 250 poor families had left the town in search for water. **WASDA** identified this vulnerable group and provided immediate water trucking while ICRC undertakes the repair of town's main borehole.

Improving Water Sources and AWD Control in Somaliland

German Red Cross was able to bridge the funding gap with the HRF allocation for their on-going WASH activities in Somaliland to contain AWD by addressing WASH in the affected areas.

Establishment of Mine Action Coordination Centre for South Central Somalia

UNDP has established a Mine Action Coordination Centre (MAC) in Baidoa to facilitate mine action related activities in South Central and provide mine related advisory services in support of humanitarian activities in the area.

Investigation into Sudden Camel Death in Puntland

In response to the unusual high loss of camels to sudden death in Northern Somalia, where camels are the most important livestock, **VSF-Germany** is conducting clinical investigation with a view to controlling the outbreak.

Livelihood Support for Vulnerable Agro-Pastoralist in Bakool

ARAO provided agricultural inputs to improve food security of 1,040 agro-pastoralist households in Bakool, who had become vulnerable by displacement following inter-clan fighting and subsequent drought.

HRF in 2008

Through the collaborative allocation decision-making process involving the Advisory Board and the Clusters, it is hoped that the HRF will continue contributing to the enhancement of coordinated and coherent humanitarian response and to the increased complementarity

amongst the existing funding mechanisms and processes, the Consolidated Appeals Process (CAP), CERF, HRF and others. In 2008, the HRF is also committed to strengthen gender mainstreaming in all projects that it funds. Furthermore, the HRF will continue its effort to improve the monitoring and evaluation of the projects it funds through on-going monitoring by the network of OCHA field offices and other Agencies and internal and external evaluations

The HRF has carried forward an estimated \$9.15 million into 2008. By taking into consideration the commitments made in 2007 which have not yet been disbursed in full, the available funds at the beginning of 2008 were an estimated \$8.73 million. The Fund has committed over \$3.5 million to date in 2008. Another \$2 million are in immediate pipe line, mainly for response to the ongoing severe drought in Mudug and Galugaduud as well as to sustain life saving interventions for IDPs in and around Mogadishu.
