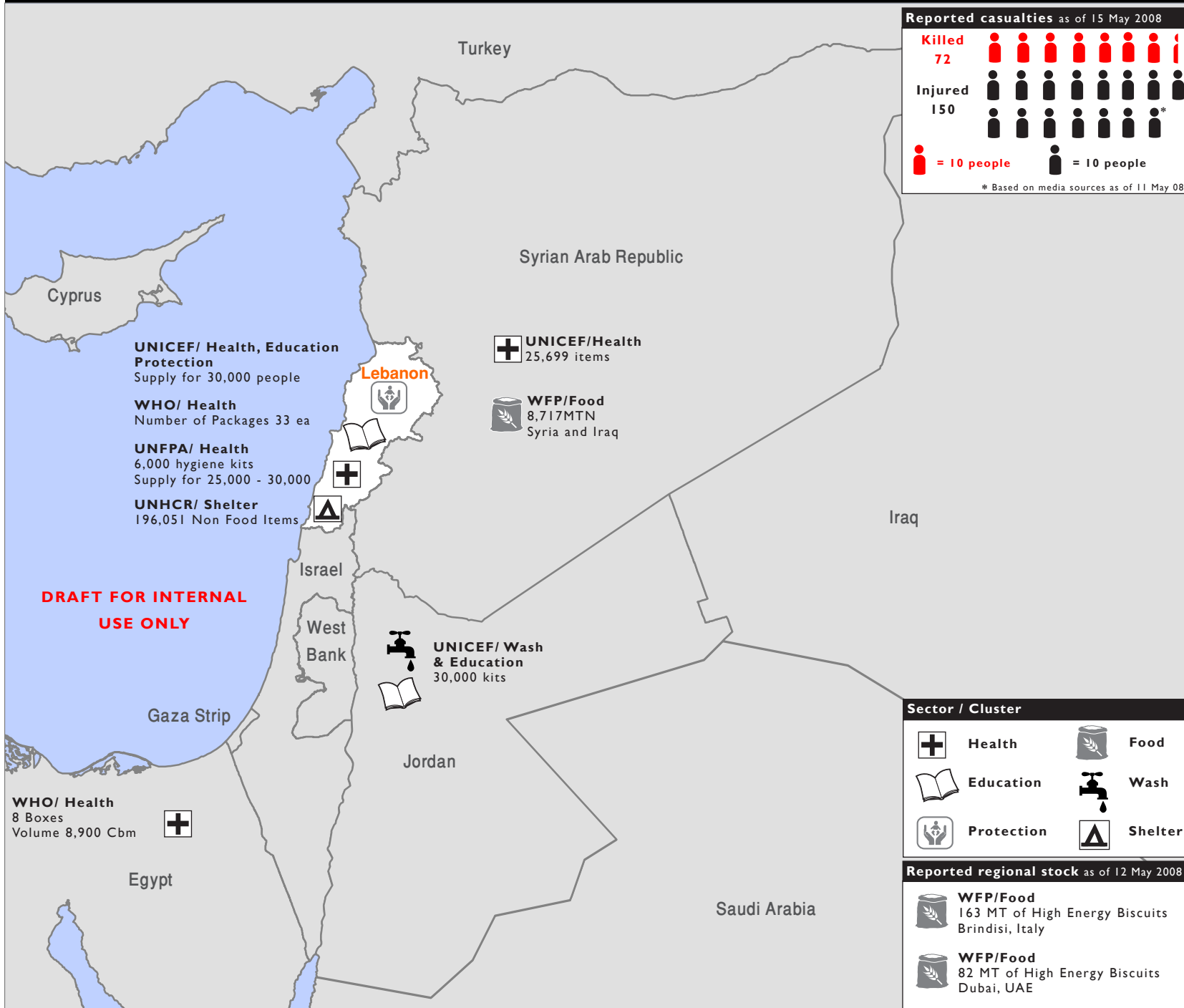


# Who Has What Where: Emergency Stockpiles in Lebanon - as of 15 May 2008



## SITUATION

- According to government statistics, **72 people** have been killed, of which at least **44 are civilians**.
- According to media sources approximately **150 people** have been wounded, of which at least **129 are civilians** as of 11 May 08.
- Many barricades in Beirut have been removed, and the traffic flow is increasing. Some barricades remain along the Green Line\*.
- Beirut airport is still **closed**.
- The Road to Syria has been opened one way (from Lebanon to Syria), but the barricades are still present.
- The Lebanese Army is still deployed in Beirut, Tripoli and Shouf areas.
- There is a strong response capacity among local, national and international NGOs, coupled with considerable capacity among UNRWA and in-country UN Agencies but contingency plans are being updated should greater needs arise
- The opposition has significantly altered the balance of power in Lebanon, and taken control of West Beirut and Mount Lebanon range.
- The situation in Lebanon is calming down after the fighting over the weekend.

\* The unofficial boundary between East and West Beirut, created during the Civil War.
